<u>Reposted from Summer, 2022 Meeting</u>: FLISA reached agreement with Terry on a \$5,000 stipend and travel reimbursement costs for just the FLISA Winter and Summer meetings (not the NAFIS DC meetings). Terry believes it would take two years (thru July 2024) to get everything up to speed for FLISA.

FLISA will review annually June, 2023 (reflecting on the effectiveness of the work on Monday.com and the status technology itself for our work) before renewing for a second year.

XII. Review of FY 23 Congressional NAFIS Budget and FY 24 NAFIS Appropriations Ask

FY 2023 Appropriations

NAFIS requested a \$57 million increase (\$55M for Basic Support, \$2M for Federal Property) and sent a legislative action alert to members in November with a letter to advocate for FY23 House-passed program amounts.

The Impact Aid FY23 funding was finalized with \$1.618 billion, a \$61 million increase from the FY22 enacted level. The final FY23 funding level for Impact Aid was also greater than both the House and Senate Appropriations Committees' recommendations. The enacted funding breakdown is as follows:

- Basic Support: \$1.468 billion (\$59 million increase)
- Federal Property: \$78.31 million (\$1 million increase)
- Children with Disabilities: \$48.3 million (No increase)
- Facilities Maintenance: \$4.83 million (No increase)
- Construction: \$18.41 million (\$1 million increase)

FY 2024 Appropriations

The proposed request is an increase of \$70 million to the Department of Education's Impact Aid Program.



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- \$65M Basic Support
- \$2M Federal Property
- \$1.5M Construction
- \$1.5M Children with Disabilities

This request takes into consideration the percentage increase in the Local Contribution Rate for Section 7003 and potential impact of ESSER funding to district's Impact Aid payments.

XIII. Other NAFIS Legislation for 118th Congress:

Advancing Toward Impact Aid Full Funding Legislation

NAFIS has already begun work to reintroduce legislation to fully fund the Impact Aid Program focusing on updating funding numbers with sponsor Representative Mike Levin (D-CA-49) and recruiting new Republican champions. This bill creates a five-year glidepath to:

- Fully fund Basic Support (based on FY20 data)
- Provide a proportional increase \$55 million to Federal Property
- Increase the Children with Disabilities funding by \$45 million, to fund each eligible student at \$2,000 (or \$1,000 for an off-base military-connected student)
- Include an increase to construction funding by \$21.5 million

The bill, if passed, would not provide automatic funding, as it is an authorizing bill. However, it will serve as a messaging tool to illustrate congressional support for Impact Aid and pressure the Appropriations Committees to consider these substantial increases.

School Infrastructure

NAFIS will work to reintroduce and support legislation that increases funding for school infrastructure. Will merge NIISA and NAFIS infrastructure bills from last Congress.

Pay Teachers Act

Sen. Bernie Sanders, as Chairman of the Senate Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions Committee, plans to introduce the Pay Teachers Act. Sec. 103 of the Act. Would **double Impact Aid Basic Support Payments authorized under section 7003(b) of ESEA by providing \$1.46 billion in mandatory funding** in fiscal year 2024, and for each succeeding fiscal year, the amount appropriated for the preceding year indexed to inflation. There is no requirement/restriction on the use of these funds for teacher salaries. This is broadly a messaging bill as it has little to no chance of becoming law. The AFT and NEA have already endorsed. NAFIS lobbyist's summary is included.

Impact Aid Coalitions

The bipartisan House and Senate Impact Aid Coalitions were established in the 1990s and have since led successful efforts to protect and prioritize the Impact Aid program. There are more than 100 current Members of Congress on the coalitions. We are hoping to continue to grow these numbers and have the largest coalitions yet by the end of the 118th Congress.
